A place where families can come when they have to make the difficult decisions between paying for groceries instead of paying for their car payment - the thing that gets them to work to pay for everything else. This fiscal year (July 2021-June 2022) has been one where, we believe, we have given this hope of a better tomorrow to more of our friends, neighbors and community members than ever before.

There is no doubt that the state of the world, the increasing cost of living and the seemingly never-ending pandemic are responsible for the greater need for our services within the community.

The crazy amount of work that has gone into us giving reprieve to those coming to us for help has not been done by one, but by our few staff members, our many, many amazing volunteers, our dedicated board of directors who do so much behind the scenes, and our generous donors who trust us to carry out our mission.

While we feel that we have done an incredible job in keeping up with the demand, this year has also been one of hardships. We have had to spend late nights loading trucks with frozen foods from a broken freezer, starting up the trucks to go out for morning pickups to realize that catalytic converters were stolen, and we have had to spend more money than ever to purchase food because we weren't going to have enough to make it through the next distribution.

Despite these challenges, this year has been an exciting one. We have begun a new program with Lake Stevens ECEAP families, where we get the opportunity to provide families with all the ingredients to make culturally relevant meals as a family. We have finished Phase One of our new building and have broken ground on the vertical build. Soon, we will have a place where we can offer more than just food to our community.



VOLUNTEERS

With only two full time staff and one part time staff, over 90% of the work performed by the Lake Stevens Community Food Bank is carried out by our dedicated team of volunteers. They carry out sorting incoming food, both perishable and nonperishables, they pick up the food from the local grocery stores, they pack boxes for distribution, and they help put the food into the hands of those who need it. They are also our biggest ambassadors.

There is also our team of Board of Directors who believe in the work we do so much that they help keep the operation running behind the scenes with fundraising, events, marketing and so much more.


OUR IMPACT




